Helen Keller's Speech to the Lions International Convention

in Cedar Point, Ohio, June 30, 1925

Dear Lions and Ladies:

I suppose you have heard the legend that represents opportunity as a capricious lady, who knocks at every door but once, and if the door isn't opened quickly, she passes on, never to return. And that is as it should be. Lovely, desirable ladies won't wait. You have to go out and grab 'em.

I am your opportunity. I am knocking at your door. I want to be adopted. The legend doesn't say what you are to do when several beautiful opportunities present themselves at the same door. I guess you have to choose the one you love best. I hope you will adopt me. I am the youngest here, and what I offer you is full of splendid opportunities for service.

The American Foundation for the Blind is only four years old. It grew out of the imperative needs of the blind, and was called into existence by the sightless themselves. It is national and international in scope and in importance. It represents the best and most enlightened thought on our subject that has been reached so far. Its object is to make the lives of the blind more worthwhile everywhere by increasing their economic value and giving them the joy of normal activity.

Try to imagine how you would feel if you were suddenly stricken blind today. Picture yourself stumbling and groping at noonday as in the night; your work, your independence, gone. In that dark world wouldn't you be glad if a friend took you by the hand and said, "Come with me and I will teach you how to do some of the things you used to do when you could see"? That is just the kind of friend the American Foundation is going to be to all the blind in this country if seeing people will give it the support it must have.

You have heard how through a little word dropped from the fingers of another, a ray of light from another soul touched the darkness of my mind and I found myself, found the world, found God. It is because my teacher learned about me and broke through the dark, silent imprisonment which held me that I am able to work for myself and for others. It is the caring we want more than money. The gift without the sympathy and interest of the giver is empty. If you care, if we can make the people of this great country care, the blind will indeed triumph over blindness.

The opportunity I bring to you, Lions, is this: To foster and sponsor the work of the American Foundation for the Blind. Will you not help me hasten the day when there shall be no preventable blindness; no little deaf, blind child untaught; no blind man or woman unaided? I appeal to you Lions, you who have your sight, your hearing, you who are strong and brave and kind.

Will you not constitute yourselves Knights of the Blind in this crusade against darkness?

I thank you.

First, on behalf of the TEAM Sheehan Charitable Foundation, I'd like to thank all the MD5M Lions for their generous contributions to the TSCF. As you may know, "The mission of the TEAM Sheehan Charitable Foundation is to empower MD5M Lions clubs to provide greater service by boosting their ability to complete community projects with matching grants."

We're very proud of the first set of Grants we were able to award during our first year of matching Grants. They were:

\$1,876 to the Princeton Lions Club in District 5M8 for the purchase of a freezer benefiting a local foodshelf.

\$3,000 to the Sauk Rapids Lions Club in District 5M8 for a statue at the local Art Park.

\$1,700 to the Kimball Lions in District 5M8 for the purchase of a Hands-Free Iris Vision Live 2.0 for a local visually impaired student..

\$2,500 Canadian to the Shoal Lake Lions Club in 5M13 to purchase an electric piano and dolly for the Shoal Lake Community Hall.

Special Olympics Minnesota Summer Games is at the University of Minnesota from June 20-22nd.

The university of Minnesota will host the annual Special Olympics Minnesota Summer Games! Roughly 3,000 athletes will be competing in basketball, basketball, swimming, and gymnastics throughout the weekend. Outside of competition, there will be entertainment in the athlete Village, health screenings for athletes, Celebration Ceremonies, and many other activities for everyone! Summer Games is open to the public and family friendly!

The Lions have played a major part in this competition for many years, and will once again host the Opening Eyes screening. As part of the Healthy Athletes program offerings, Opening Eyes provides a complete eye exam, conducted by eye doctors and eye care professionals. During the Opening Eyes screening, Athletes have the opportunity to receive new eye glasses, sunglasses or sports goggles, free of charge! Opening Eyes is presented by Lions Club International.

Opening Eyes in Minnesota was first undertaken by Lions Clubs of 5M5, but we need you to make this screening happen! Opening Eyes volunteers directly impact the health of SOMN Athletes! Volunteers will also have the opportunity to meet and interact with Special Olympics Minnesota Athletes, and also meet Lions from other clubs and other districts. Volunteers will receive a Summer Games Volunteer t-shirt and Volunteers working over six hours will also receive a complimentary lunch.




Select "Scheduled Screening"

In addition to ticket to the State Fair you can request to be reimbursed for mileage at \$0.50 per mile and if traveling a long way can be reimbursed at the rate of \$75 for lodging.



Can Do Canines has been supporting a bill in the Minnesota legislature signed into law by Governor Walz on May 8. The new law will expand housing protections for volunteers of

assistance dog organizations to be able to train service dogs in homes managed by Homeowners Associations (HOAs). This spring, Can Do Canines Executive

Director Jeff Johnson and Lead Trainer Emily Hedenland; along with Tucker, Bueller, Pearl, and Novah, assistance dogs in training; testified before four different House and Senate committees. SF1317, authored by Sen. Bonnie Westlin (DFL-Plymouth), and HF688, authored by Rep. Cedrick Frazier (DFL-New Hope), will prohibit HOAs from placing restrictions on volunteers of service dog organizations who are training service dogs. This will allow more volunteers to potentially host assistance dogs in their homes. The bill passed the House 114-15, and the Senate 60-2. The new law will take effect on August 1.

Senate 60-2. The new law will take effect on August 1. In a news release from the Minnesota House of Representatives, Rep. Frazier is quoted as saying, "Service dog training organizations like Can Do Canines depend on dedicated volunteers who open their homes to future assistance dogs. These volunteers play a crucial role in preparing these animals to transform the lives of people with disabilities. Unfortunately, many potential volunteers face housing restrictions that prevent them from participating in this vital work. I'm proud my legislation will build upon existing protections for service dogs by extending them to service dogs in training, enabling accredited organizations throughout Minnesota to expand their volunteer base and ultimately serve more indi-

viduals in need. By removing these barriers, we can ensure that more lives will be changed through the remarkable human-canine partnerships that assistance dogs make possible."

MD5M Lions KidSight Foundation

Your MD5M Lions KidSight Foundation continues its work helping detect children who have vision issues that may impact their learning and quality of life.

During the 3rd quarter of 2025 (January 1 to March 31) 14,204 children were screened and 1,574 referred for professional care, an 11% referral rate. We will be screening over the summer at community events and the Minnesota State Fair.

We have several instruments reaching the end of their serviceable life and have applied for a matching grant from LCI to replace 20 instruments with an updated device. We are awaiting approval by LCI.

We will be having our annual meeting in Bemidji May 16-17 to discuss the future of our program, elect new officers and recognize those directors who will be leaving the board. There are retiring directors who have been unable to find a Lion from their district to serve on the board-if you receive an invitation to serve, please consider agreeing to serve.

Since KidSight is now an international program, our data recording site has now been changed to allow all Constitution Areas to enter screening results-not just the US Clubs, a major improvement.

Morden Roaring Leos recognized internationally for fundraising work

"We were just blown away and also didn't know about it, so [we] were shocked."

This is what Yevgeniya Tatarenko, the supervisor of the Roaring Morden Leos youth club, says about a prestigious award that it recently received from Lions International.

What is the Roaring Leos club?

The unique award goes to a club that, according to Tatarenko, is rooted in giving back to the Pembina Valley. It's the youth version of <u>Morden's Roaring Lions</u>. "[They] meet once a month to work on some of the projects or some of the fundraising events that bring together the community," she says, adding that the group fundraises for organizations like <u>South Central Cancer Resource</u> and <u>Genesis</u> <u>House</u>. "They are always here to make a difference in the community."

Leo Service Project Award

Tatarenko says the honor received by the group is the Leo Service Project Award, which acknowledges a recent project that it executed — <u>a fundraising puzzle night in support of</u> <u>local organizations</u>.

"This award is from our international president, Fabrício Olivieri, who is from Brazil," she says. "He was at our multiple district convention in Bloomington, Minnesota at the end of April, and out of the 38 Leos clubs in our multiple district, which encompasses Minnesota and Northwest Ontario and Manitoba, he awarded one award to one Leos clubs and our Leos club in Morden was chosen."

For the Roaring Morden Leos, it's a significant achievement.

"They were honored to get this award for what they did," says Tatarenko.

She says the group has become a shining example of what a Leos club can be.

The award presentation

When it comes to the award presentation, Angel Jain, the president of the Morden Roaring Leos, received it from Dueck on May 22nd.

The award was also accompanied by a video from Lions International. "The looks on their faces when I played the video of me being presented their award was absolutely priceless," says Dueck. "It was really cool."

They are such a 'robust' group of young people For Dueck, the group deserves the recognition. It's a special one.

"They are such a robust group of young people," she says. "They're all newcomers to Canada ... and all they want to do is give back to the area that has given them so much since their families have moved here."

In Dueck's view, the Morden Roaring Leos are making a name for themselves through their community work.

"Not just in our local community, but in our multiple district and in Lions International itself," she says. "Lions international is in over 200 countries and geographical areas, and every single convention [or meeting] that I go to, I just have to mention I'm from Morden and people know who our Leos are. They have made a name for themselves internationally for things that they're doing, which is amazing. I'm just so proud."

In the end, Dueck believes that recognizing young people like the Leos is important for the community.

"Sometimes young people feel like they're forgotten or they're not worth anything, and these Leos and the other young people in our area — they're our future leaders. We need to recognize them," she says.
